Volunteering Opportunities

Our Lady's School Site

It has been interesting to hear of residents near the new housing development in Osbaldwick having to resort to direct action to get the contractors to abide by planning regulations after appeals to the Council had met with no improvement to their situation. Within 24 hours a manager from the developers was suddenly available to sort the matter out. This is very similar to the problems local residents have had with the developer of Our Lady's school site, now renamed Hob Stone, and it shows that taking action into your own hands gets results.

The building work at what we must now call Hob Stone continues. It is not just social housing as we were originally told it would be, but a mix of private and social. As is already obvious from the cleared site and visible boundaries, the impact on the Moor will be enormous once residents have moved in and there are street lights on all night, noise from people and traffic and dozens of extra cats around.

There seems to be far less birdsong and bird life around the site and on that side of the Moor, partly because the mature trees that surrounded the old school site have been felled and partly because of the activity of the contractors. Although the developers have promised to plant young trees, it will be decades before they mature and provide a habitat for birds comparable to the one which has been removed. We have just seen the felling of mature trees on the Terry's site despite much local opposition. It seems as though the Council either doesn't have the power to protect our environment or the will to do it and the developers get what they want.

Cable Laying

There have already been further depredations on the Moor from the cable contractors. The areas damaged by cable laying last year have not been levelled and reseeded as they should have been and the main path the contractors used across the Moor has become rutted and potholed. In fact one of the pits was dug up again in February with vehicles again driving across the Moor. They did not use the access designated for their use but instead came through the gate near Lidl, leaving the area completely churned up and muddy. The Council, or at least the relevant council department, was not aware that this was going to happen or had indeed happened until the Friends pointed it out. We have made repeated requests to to the Council for the damage to be repaired, and copied in local councillors, but no action has been taken yet.

Although these last items may seem negative, they show that we need to be vigilant to protect the Moor and the Friends need as much support as we can get. Please encourage friends and neighbours to become members and take an active part in looking after the Moor and protecting it. You don't need to join the committee; even reporting what's happening on the Moor via the website is a help.

Cows

The cows were taken off early at the end of last summer. There were repeated incidents of gates being left open by contractors or others and cows wandering off the Moor, as described in the last Newsletter, so in the end the grazier had to take them away. We expect them back on in early April as usual.

In Brief

- ❖ The high point for excitement on the Moor has to be when a red hot air balloon almost landed on the Moor at around 8.30am on 11 September. It descended towards the Moor as if it would land, hovered for 5 minutes, then took off again as residents, dog walkers and parents taking children to school stopped to watch and take photos.
- ❖ A new sewer has been built across the west side of the Moor (the Lidl end) for the Hob Stone development and linked into the existing drainage system.
- ❖ We are delighted to have a new member to look after our website and social media presence. He has been revising and updating it and bringing up to date our Facebook and Twitter presence. Do take a look: friendsofhobmoor.org.uk
- A kingfisher has been sighted on the beck alongside Hob Moor Drive but there has been neither sight nor sound of a skylark.
- ❖ We are disappointed that Mark Tyszka is unable to lead his popular walk this year as he has done so many times in the past. We look forward to him being able to continue in the future.
- ❖ The banks that were repaired on the north side of the Moor by Hob Moor Drive have regrown but the snowdrops that were there in such profusion have vanished. We hoped that they might have appeared on the Moor where the mud from the bank was dumped, but unfortunately this has not been the case.
- ❖ A select group of five braved the elements to celebrate the Winter Solstice on the Moor on December 21st. It was bitterly cold but the Famous Five had a good time (they said). The Summer Solstice is a much warmer (usually, but this is Yorkshire) and better attended occasion with food, drink and music. Do join us. Details are on the events page.
- ❖ One of the horse chestnut trees on Little Hob Moor next to Tadcaster Road has had to be felled because it was diseased.
- ❖ Elizabeth Smith, who will be leading a walk on the Moor on 31st May, gave a very interesting and well received talk on the history of Hob Moor at the West Thorpe Ladies Group in March Apparently there was so much interest in the Friends she ran out of leaflets!
